Protecting your Kitten and Family from parasites

Many people do not know that kittens are just as vulnerable to **parasites** as puppies. Parasites may seriously threaten your kitten's health and that of children. Most kittens are infected with parasites transmitted from their mother.

Parasites like Roundworms, Hookworms and Tapeworms can be transmitted to your family.

Heartworm Disease is becoming an increasing health problem in cats. Heartworms are transmitted by infected mosquitoes and can affect the heart and lungs. It is a common perception that indoor cats are not vulnerable to heartworm disease. However, studies show 25% of infected cats are reported as indoor.

Ear mites are tiny, white, highly contagious parasites that can infect all of the pets in your home. As a result of mites, severe infections may develop. Common signs are dark, crusty, dried material in the ear canal, head shaking and ear scratching.

Feline Leukemia (FeLV)

FeLV is one of the most common of all cat viruses. It is a complex viral disease of which leukemia (cancer of the white blood cells) is only a small part. The virus tends to damage the body in multiple ways: it can cause tumors or leukemia of the red, white or bone marrow cells; dysfunction of the immune system resulting in life threatening infections. FeLV can be transmitted from one cat to another by saliva, urine, feces, licking, biting, sneezing or an FeLV positive mother whose kittens are in the womb. Food and water dishes are likely sources of infection as well.

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus Feline AIDS (FIV)

FIV is similar to human AIDS. Although cats with FIV cannot transmit the immunodeficiency virus to humans, the viruses act the same way: they both attack the immune system. FIV is broken down into three stages: acute, sub clinical and the chronic clinical stage. The acute stage lasts from 3 to 6 months, characterized with mild illnesses. Often this stage goes unnoticed. The sub clinical stage can last from months to years. The affected cat appears healthy but their immune system is slowly deteriorating. During this stage chronic mouth, respiratory, intestinal, fungal, eye and nervous system disease can occur along with cancers. A cat diagnosed with FIV has an average life span of 5 years. FIV is present in the saliva of infected cats, commonly transmitted from mother to kitten while in the womb, but can be transmitted by nursing. If you are a multiple cat household it is a good idea to get all of your cats checked yearly, especially outdoor cats.
